

Notes about Format of Documents:

Any text without an OCR or TXT file may be manually transcribed, in the case of handwritten documents, or passed through some miscellaneous word-processing program in order to enable comparative textual analysis practices. The metadata of institutional archives' objects (i.e. all of those objects listed below) may be analyzed and compared using tools of the likes of OpenRefine, enabling the comparison (to some degree) of objects of widely variant media.

“The truth is it is all nonsense and irreconcilable with Divine truth in regard to the Mental Capacity of Woman, nothing but long prejudices with the dominer spirit of Man has Kept woman from occupying a higher elevation in literature & art, "but mens tyranny & jelousy, and wilfull usurpation of her normal arights &c.”

These students believe that if they are more educated on Women’s Suffrage they are not able to be full participating women in society. Furthermore, they call out Vassar College for being one of the only women’s colleges that does not have an official Women’s Suffrage group.

It is recorded that "forty undergraduates, ten alumnae..." and guests from New York City came to speak. xDifferent speakers used different issues, such as trade unionism and social motherhood, to explain the need for Women's Suffrage and more equal rights for women in general.
